In summary, we had 38 boats registered (33 in 2015), 35 started for Bermuda, 29 finished (3 motored into Bermuda at the end, 2 turned around (Fyling Turle had almost total electronics failure due to a nearby electrical storm and Scallywag II who lost both the primary and secondary autopilots) and one boat, Spadefoot, that was abandoned due to potential keel failure currently heading towards Bermuda. 31 boats started in Bermuda (23 in 2015) for Newport, 2 didn't finish (Tyche motored in and Pocket Rocket returned to Bermuda due to keel problems and will be shipped back home along with Team Wichard due to a cracked keel box, Strummer is on his way to the Azores, and Melantho 2 had to go back home after the awards) and 29 finished (21 in 2015).

The first day on the trip down to Bermuda some thunder storms developed which was when Flying Turtle lost his electronics. The Gulf Stream was benign. Scallywag II lost both its autopilots and decided home was a better option than trying to make it to Bermuda. The last two days saw strong winds, very bad seas and close hauled course. Lots of pounding and lots of broken gear. Boats not well prepared found that out. The return leg started off with a SW out of the harbor but soon turned to the NW and all the boats were going east of the rhumb line. Most boats stayed East of the rhumb line for the whole trip. A period of no wind lasted depending on when you hit it; fast boats were out of it faster than the slow boats. The rest of the trip had some very nice conditions with reaches and there were many comments about how nice the sailing was for that period. Coming into Newport wasn't so hot due to fog. Concussion developed problems with a crack in his mast. Patched it up and limped into Newport under Coast Guard accompaniment.

We were blessed with 13 new skippers starting this year (Barcanova – Stephen Gay, Breakaway – Paul Grimes, Concussion – Jason Seibert, Corvus - Chris Terjewicz, Gillette Children's Hospital – Richard Lett, Inigo Montoya – Mike Piper, Melantho 2 – Jack Clayton, Pocket Rocket – Marcus Cochran, Prairie Gold – Phil Haydon, Seriana – Roger Shepley, Spadefoot – Justin Wolfe, Trouble No Trouble – Brian Gray and Yankee Girl – Zachary Lee (some of these "newbies" receive trophies). And there is even more new crew. There was another new boat, Rocinante – Richard Rohrer, however he had to withdraw from the race due to hardware issues; I hope he comes back for 2019.

- The OSTAR and TwoStar coming to Newport were hit with a strong storm; 4 boats were sunk and several turned back but no one lost their lives.

Restarted about 11pm but found the backstay still loose. They tried several knots on the backstay to tighten it and babied the rig back to Newport.
- Ray Renaud and Dan Alanso on Dan's dinghy went to the aid of Doug Shearer when his motor died after the finish and Doug couldn't get the genoa furled. It was a dangerous situation. Bermuda Harbor Radio called me about the dinghy headed out which isn't allowed by Customs. Next, we hear Bermuda Radio hailing Nimros about a dinghy being towed and someone on the boat against Custom's rules (they thought only Ray was on the boat but Dan was on also). All we could picture was the Bermuda One-Two Race being banned from Bermuda. Tyche towed Nimros in to anchor and was supposed to take Doug to Customs but then we hear that the dinghy was to take Doug to Customs. Now we thought they were really in trouble. On top of that Ray had an expired passport. Nope, no problem. Either Customs were lenient due to the dangerous situation or the Bermuda Harbor Radio person who I had befriended didn't report it.
