25th Biennial Bermuda One-Two AGENDA FOR 2025 BERMUDA 1-2 NEWPORT AWARDS PARTY 28 June 2025

In summary, we had 15 boats registered (29 in 2023), 12 started for Bermuda (24 in 2023), one was left adrift, 11 boats made it to Bermuda of which 1 did not finish (however all 12 skippers made it to Bermuda). 12 boats started in Bermuda (18 in 2023) for Newport (II Tender was picked up in Bermuda), and 9 finished (18 in 2023). Skipper/Crew came from Seatle and the usuals from the New York, Virginia, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Maine and even 3 from Rhode Island as well as from Southwest England and New Zeland.

The trip to Bermuda was highlighted (make that a low light) by the dismasting of *Mini829* just after crossing the Gulf Stream. *Windswept* suffered a knockdown causing electronic failures and a beat up Genoa, and *Fathom* was hit by lightning losing his VHF and not being able to start his motor plus other things Tim is still discovering; both still finished the race. *Strummer* who picked up Alex on the dismasted *Mini829* lost his autopilot on the way to get Alex. *Windswept* who normally communicates via SailMail did not on the first leg. Discovered that the servers he was trying to communicate through were down. He got it working for the second leg.

The second leg was forecast to have fairly light Southwest breezes. A lot of the boats were becalmed quite a bit except for the fastest boat, *Scowling Dragon*, that managed to stay ahead of most of the slow stuff. Dragon managed to do the return in just under 3 days but missed making a record. The next 3 boats managed to avoid the worst of the dead zones; *Groupe 5*, *Alchemy* and *Abilyn*. This was a real slow race for the slower part of the fleet finishing in 6-7 days. This was the scenario that the slower boats got slower.

This year's weather in Bermuda was a big improvement over the 2023 race. We had light to moderate Westerly winds, temps in the mid 70s at night to low 80s during the day and it only rained once and that was short. In 2023 there was a lot of rain and cooler temperature. The comradery amongst the skippers was again nice to see. The gang led by Peter Becker were able to move *Fathom* from broadside, with a breeze against them, on the fixed pier to the moorings med moore without a motor. There was a very successful Fish Fry (wonderful food provided by Brenda and crew) at the Dinghy Club, two well attended tours at Bermuda Radio, a wonderful tour of Fort Albert by Patrick Paley, a night out at Wahoo's Restaurant with 23 people, a very successful Awards then a demonstration by the Gombe Dancers with Merebea Danforth and Pat Dionne joining in the dance at one point and then the Awards Dinner afterwards. This time I remembered to have pictures taken of the single-handed skippers.

We were blessed with 6 new skippers starting this year (6 in 2023 also): *Alchemy* – Erica Lush our only female skipper, *Chicama* – Pat Dionne, *Fathom* – Tim Brewer, *Groupe* 5 – William McKeige, *Mini829* – Alex Khandros, and *Young American* – Adrien Blanc (the youngest skipper in the race). Ages ranged from 21 to 82 for an average age of 52 which I think is quite lower than in recent past.
